

Library Corner by Marlis Pehling, Librarian

We have a fascinating book of the story of a family who escaped the Nazis in 1941 on their fishing boat. The 63-foot Kaare II had already helped to evacuate civilians from heavily bombed west coast towns.



Ottar Nøvik, author of "Escape with Kaare," realized he had to help his family flee the Germans and sailed his boat to several towns to gather them before departing with 23 aboard.

Kaare II first traveled to the Faroe Islands but was not allowed to continue to England. So, the group sailed for Canada, encountering several days of horrendous weather en route.


Landing originally in Nova Scotia, most of the family sailed the next year for Vancouver, Canada, where the family established a successful fishing business. The book includes many newspaper articles about the family's ordeal.

It's a fascinating story of the Nøvik family's flight to freedom. Anyone who had family members living in Norway during the war will find it very interesting.



Homegrown Nordic Theater of the Mind

Bothell Lodge is Hotbed of Traditional and New Audio Media

Some of the best Scandinavian storytelling and music can be found right inside our Bothell Lodge. Both Seth Tufteland and Eric Stavney are delivering Nordic content to the world through radio and podcasting.

“The Scandinavian Hour” with Seth Tufteland

Seth Tufteland hosts “The Scandinavian Hour” radio program on 1150 AM KKNW. Playing mostly music of different genres, the hour also delivers the latest news and local bulletin board items for the Scandinavian community. Seth intersperses short interviews with musicians and others as well.

He began with longtime host Doug Warner in 2017 as one of six co-hosts (including Eric) to create a succession plan for Doug, who was thinking about his retirement. Doug originally began co-hosting the program in 1959, when he took it over from another retiring host.

With family roots in Telemark, Seth decided to go into radio with the encouragement of family and friends that said he was well-known in the Scandinavian community. As fellow co-hosts left and Doug retired in 2020, Seth remained to singularly host and produce the show.

Seth notes, “The most fun thing about the show is getting to listen to the vast amounts of music from Norway, Sweden, Denmark, Finland, Iceland, the Faroe Islands

and local U.S. groups.” Among his favorites are Christmas shows and interviewing a musician in Norway from the studio in 2019.”

“The Scandinavian Hour” attracts an older audience that have listened for years. Seth wants to add younger listeners but the early morning time of airing may present some challenges.

Eventually, Seth says, “My goal is to change the format from radio to podcast but there are many challenges to address with regard to music copyright laws.”

He adds, “I am also interested in taking on a sidekick to eventually take over for me.”

“Nordic on Tap” by Eric Stavney

Before he got the bug for podcasting, Eric was one of the co-hosts on “The Scandinavian Hour.”

“I liked telling Norwegian folktales to my kids and wondered if they could be heard by a wider audience,” remembers Eric. “Then I thought I could keep doing interviews with interesting people and play those conversations on a show through the internet. The concept of recorded shows “on tap” was born.”

With roots five generations back on his father’s side from the Trondheim area of Norway, Eric created his first podcast

while still co-hosting “The Scandinavian Hour.” He

interviewed a Danish musician playing in Seattle and found it hard to edit a conversation of 90 minutes down to five. So, he also created a longer podcast.

Eric offers music, interviews, folktales and hygge with a Nordic flavor. Posted at nordicontap.com, he adds links to additional music and interesting articles.

A favorite show is a vivid episode conducted in the barn about the fjord horses of Rory and Kristin Miller. He's also spoken with Mari Boine (a well-known Sami musician) in her house at the top of the world and Dr. Matthew Spriggs on Vanuatu in the Pacific about Thor Heyerdahl's views on migrations. Listeners from the U.S., China, Poland, Norway, Australia, Canada and beyond enjoy his podcasts.

As he inches closer to his regular-job retirement, Eric

says, "It's been a joy to do so far." But he acknowledges that he's slowing down in making new podcasts and hopes he'll be able to manage the costs in the future.

Needless to say, Erik and Seth are huge fans of each other. Both have embraced sharing the culture of Scandinavia through words and music.
