Oct. 9 Marks 200 Years of Norwegian Immigration

On Leif Erickson Day, Oct. 9, the replica Restauration will arrive in New York City to commemorate the 200th anniversary of Norwegian immigration to the U.S. The modern-day Restauration departed Stavanger on July 4 to farewells by three generations of Norwegian royals and plenty of fanfare. Luella Grangaard, Sons of Norway international board chair, attended as well to wave bon voyage.

The modern replica ship sailed on the same day from Stavanger as the 54-foot original Restauration. Present-day Restauration will arrive to the U.S. 200 years to the day that the original ship entered New York Harbor with 52 passengers and launched the reason many of us are here today.

While most Norwegians immigrated to America for economic opportunity, the first group was made up of religious dissenters. Often called the Norwegian Mayflower, the Restauration's arrival in New York spawned a wave of Norwegian immigration to both the United States and later Canada. Within a century, more than 800,000 Norwegians followed.

Restauration will arrive just before 12 noon at Pier 16 next to the South Street Seaport Museum to a welcome by His Royal Highness Crown Prince Haakon of Norway, local New Yorkers and Norwegian-Americans. Norwegian pop star Astrid S and the classical Ragnhild Hemsing Trio will perform. Joining the group are Ministers of Foreign Affairs Espen Barth Eide and Trade and Industry Cecilie Myrseth. There will also be a separate business

program for Crown Prince Haakon and the ministers in New York.

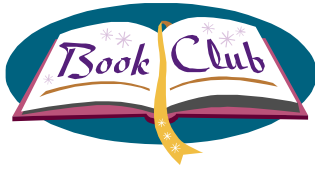

In September, we discussed “West With Giraffes,” by Lynda Rutledge. In 1938, the Great Depression lingers and Hitler is threatening Europe. Two giraffes, who miraculously survive a hurricane while crossing the Atlantic, are transported by truck from New York across country to deliver America’s first giraffes to the San Diego Zoo.



Inspired by true events, the tale weaves real-life people with fictional figures, including the world’s first female zoo director. Part adventure and part historical saga, the book explores what it means to be changed by the grace of animals, kindness of strangers

Library Corner by Marlis Pehling, Librarian

In our popular fiction section of the library is a gem of Norwegian literature: Sigrid Undset’s historical trilogy “Kristin Lavransdatter,” which follows the trials and tribulations of a medieval Norwegian woman. The



individual novels are “Kransen” (“The Wreath,” 1920), “Husfrue” (“The Wife,” 1921), and “Korset” (“The Cross,” 1922).

The first book is the story of the courtship of a headstrong and passionate young woman and a dangerously charming and impetuous man, Erlend. The second volume continues to follow Kristin’s story and her marriage to Erlend, whose single-minded determination to become an influential social and political figure forces Kristin to take over management of Erlend’s estate while raising seven sons.

The third book tells about Kristin, Erlend and sons returning to the family home with the subsequent marriage woes and emotional turmoil. There are plenty of storylines in the trilogy that can compete with today’s soap operas.

For this work, Sigrid Undset won the Nobel Prize for literature in 1928. Happy reading!

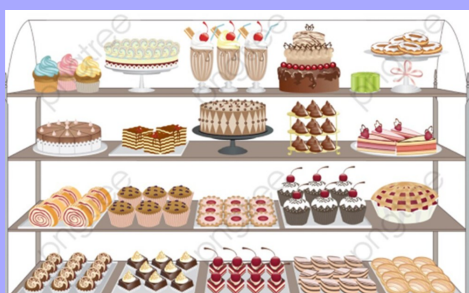

Leif Erikson Exploration to Vinland Celebrated on Oct. 9

Norse Viking and explorer Leif Erikson is known as the first European to land in America around the year 1000. Son of the Norwegian-born Erik the Red and his Icelandic wife Tjodhild, Leif grew up in Greenland. According to sagas, Leif sailed to Norway in 999. He was then baptized and commissioned to introduce Christianity to Greenland.

The saga of Erik the Red claims Leif veered off course on his way home to Greenland from Norway in the autumn of 999 and discovered a land with natural wheat fields and vines (Vinland). In the Saga of the Greenlanders, however, it is said that Leif planned an expedition that discovered Vinland. Archaeologists uncovered

a Norse settlement believed to be Vinland in the 1960s at L'Anse aux Meadows, Canada, on the northern tip of Newfoundland. Sagas also describe contact with indigenous peoples but trading turned to skirmishes. Eventually, Viking settlements were abandoned.

Leif returned to Greenland for good the following spring with a cargo of grapes and timber. Many others from Greenland and Iceland sailed to Vinland before the settlements were later vacated.

In 1964, US President Lyndon B. Johnson proclaimed Oct. 9 as a national day of remembrance for Leif Erikson's fall discovery. The date was chosen because Norwegian immigrant ship Restauration arrived in New York on Oct. 9, 1825.
