Building Association Meeting Follows November General Meeting

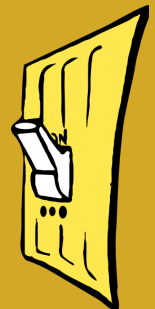

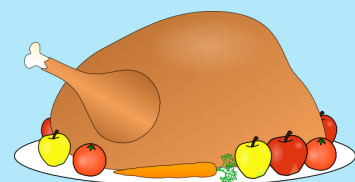

Norwegian is World Champion of Porridge

In early October, 57-year-old Norwegian Sven Seljom was crowned World Champion of Porridge Making in Scotland. From Mandal, the tech consultant was the first winner ever from Norway.

Thirty challengers from 14 countries, ranging from the U.S., Canada, India, Scotland, Pakistan, Finland and the Philippines, competed in front of hundreds at the event and via livestream on YouTube.

The championship event offers two competition categories of traditional and open. For traditional porridge, competitors are only permitted three ingredients: oats, water and salt. In the open class, anything goes for ingredients and preparation. Competitors have 30 minutes to prepare their dishes (not including soaking time) and all entries are rated by a panel of judges based on taste, texture and color.

Donning an apron from his organic oat farm suppliers, Seljom entered both categories but took the title of World Champion of Porridge Making with his traditional recipe. The champion says he loves hearty oats and used a seldom-known variety — steel cut black oats. An ancient grain, steel cut black oats have fallen out of common use in Europe over

the last 200 years. He also packed his suitcase with Mandal water and Norwegian salt to prepare his porridge. After experimenting with timing, he wound up soaking his black oats for 24 hours before the competition to maximize flavor and texture.

Seljom's open class recipe was a crème brûlée-inspired porridge with cloudberry purée folded in and a caramelized lid. He'd also experimented with using "tørrfisk," "brunost" and "fenalår" (dried cod, brown cheese and leg of lamb) as open-class additives.

Winners in each division are awarded a coveted Golden Spurtle trophy. A spurtle is a Scottish wooden stirring utensil designed to keep porridge from clumping.

Seljom, who always had wanted to enter the international competition after hearing about it on the radio, told NRK (Norwegian Broadcasting Corporation) that he will

savor the win for a long time. "It's just crazy, it actually worked! I was more moved than I would have thought." He referred to his win as "a great honor."

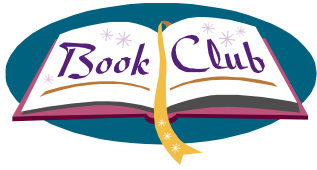

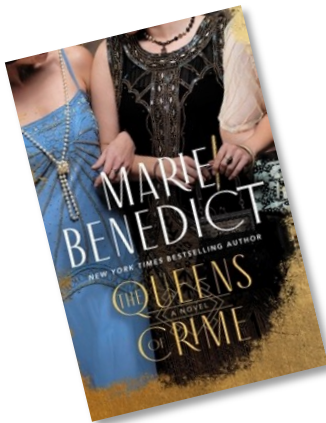

We have a wonderful DVD called "Crown Princess Märthe, the American Story." She was born a Swedish princess and married the Crown Prince Olav of Norway years before he became king.

During World War II as the Germans invaded Norway, she was forced to flee with her three children to Sweden while Olav fled to England with his father to help the war effort. President Roosevelt extended an invitation for Märtha to come to the U.S., which she accepted. Upon arrival, she and her children lived in the White House from September 1940 until the end of the year. She then moved to a more permanent home in Maryland.



Märtha became close friends with the Roosevelts and worked tirelessly to represent Norway and its cause in American politics.

She forever impacted relations positively between the U.S. and Norway. For history buffs, the PBS historical drama "Atlantic Crossing" also depicts this period in Martha's life and her time spent in the U.S.

Norwegian Soccer Team Close to World Cup '26

After 27 years without an appearance, the Norwegian men's national football (soccer) team are on the verge of qualifying for the 2026 World Cup finals, considered the ultimate contest among senior national soccer teams for all the world's countries.

Norway stand atop its qualifying group, one of 12 total European nation groupings. Sixteen European teams will make the World Cup finals that are held every four years. With two matches left, the team is in the driver's seat with the world-class talents of forwards Erling Haaland and Alexander Sørloth; midfielders Martin Ødegaard and Antonio Nusa; and others playing in Europe's top leagues.

Over the years, the Norwegian Men's National Team has had less success than its women's counterpart that has won four major tournaments and landed in the semifinals or finals several times. The men's team has missed out qualifying for 12 major tournaments since 2000.



This time, the Norwegians need to win against Estonia on Nov. 13 or Italy on Nov. 16. They have beaten both teams with Italy having only one loss to Norway. If tied for first at the end, the team with the highest goal difference will

automatically advance. Norway's "goal difference" is currently at a positive +26 goals scored. Italy's is at +10. The second-place team will head to playoffs against other top second-place teams, with four winners making it to the World Cup finals.

With next year's World Cup in Canada, U.S. and Mexico, the Norwegians could be headed our way since Seattle will host several matches. The formal game venue selections take place next spring. Here in the U.S., Fox Sports, Fubo TV and the Spanish-language VIX streaming channel have broadcast some of Norway's games.

With Norway's current position it's likely at least one of the upcoming games will be on TV here. Heia Norge!
